



PRAYER LETTER 71

Here is the first prayer letter 2026. It is proposed by Benjamin Simon, director of DM in Switzerland.

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Introduction to prayer

Switzerland is internationally regarded as a country of stability, prosperity, and social balance. Its political system, shaped by federalism and direct democracy, has contributed to strong social cohesion over many decades. Nevertheless, Switzerland too faces significant social and ecclesial challenges that reflect the changes of the present day.

From a social perspective, these challenges are evident, among other things, in increasing individualization, questions of social justice, migration, and the handling of demographic change. Despite a well-developed welfare state, solidarity and social cohesion are repeatedly coming under pressure. Economic inequalities, social isolation, and the integration of diverse cultural backgrounds call for new responses from politics, civil society, and social institutions.

The churches in Switzerland are also undergoing a profound process of change. Declining membership numbers, loss of trust, and advancing secularization confront church communities with the question of their role in a pluralistic society. At the same time, they remain important actors in the social sphere, in pastoral care, education, and advocacy for disadvantaged people. The challenge lies in connecting tradition and renewal and responding credibly to the questions of today's world.

More recent history also includes tragic events that have had a lasting impact on Switzerland's social consciousness. The fire in Crans-Montana in 2026 painfully demonstrated how vulnerable even well-organized and prosperous regions can be. The destruction, human suffering, and uncertainty triggered by this event served as a stark reminder of the importance of solidarity, prevention, and shared responsibility. Especially in such moments, social and church actors became vital pillars of comfort, cohesion, and practical assistance.

Within this field of tension between stability and change, between tradition and new challenges, Switzerland continues to seek ways to shape its social and ecclesial life in a sustainable and humane manner.
